While meeting with C.V. Johns, his stories from the field poured from the journal book of his heart. One account especially moved me (repeated here with his permission). When the Gospel came to Bothba's village, this woman responded to the Gospel - she accepted Jesus Christ as her personal Savior. Soon after she returned to her modest home and removed all her idols from the house and destroyed them, and THEN followed Christ in believer's baptism. The village's outrage was immediate and severe. In India a cow is revered as divine by many. In a twisted effort to reclaim her to their false religion, the townspeople poured cow's urine all over her, drenching her body and clothes, forcing her to drink this 'holy libation.' Then the crowd beat her....beat her severely. Broken and semi-conscious, Bothba was left a human clump on the ground. Christians from a neighboring area came to her rescue. After a month's recovery in the hospital, enduring the loss of her home and possessions and animals to her persecutors, Bothba's life and faith endured. Believers provided her with means to rebuild what she had lost. In the years since, this modern day model of Esther and Sarah and Lydia all rolled into one mighty little lady radiates Christ. Refusing to be driven from her village, she became the town's salt and light: today villagers revere the one they once persecuted and come to her for prayer and spiritual protection. What a holy heroine she is. With true faith, suffering could not snuff the light of her faith...in fact, persecution made her light shine brighter. Hallelujah!"
