A few years ago, World Reach Honduras began a basic program for local church leaders, offering short, yet solid training on topics related to leading ministries in the local church. The program consists of ten 6–7 hours long courses. Alan and Dorys had the privilege of starting the program. In two weeks, they taught the class "The Formation of a Leader's Character" at two locations with names that will be familiar: Las Vegas and Canaveral (Yes, those are the names of the locations).

The atmosphere was enthusiastic. In Canaveral, there were about 38 participants, and in Las Vegas, about 35. Alan taught about the importance of spiritual formation from the heart, while Dorys guided the participants in a "heart healing" session addressing the traumas and unresolved issues we all carry.



The final time of the class consisted of applying Micah 7:18-19. The response was moving. After writing down their pains, sins, or traumas on paper, virtually all the participants came forward to hand those burdens over to the Lord who heals and truly forgives. A few sobs were heard, and an atmosphere of restoration, healing, and relief was felt. It was a privilege to witness the Word of God having a noticeable effect on the lives of the faithful. Two years ago, a group of leaders in eastern Honduras contacted Alan to ask for help to start a Ministry Academy in that region. Classes would be held in a beautiful area with breathtaking panoramic views, albeit with difficult access and limited technological facilities.

At the same time, the students were preparing for the graduation ceremony.
